In 2023, EWFR proudly procured and distributed an astounding 5,002,682 pounds of food to food-insecure communities across Washington state, largely through the purchase of produce from local/regional farmers and producers. This accomplishment translates into more than 4.1 million nutritious meals for individuals and families facing hunger, providing critical support during these challenging times. The sheer volume of food distributed underscores our commitment to ensuring that no one in our community goes hungry, and the profound impact of our work on the lives of those we serve.

This achievement was made possible through the collective efforts of our dedicated staff, volunteers, and partners, who worked tirelessly to meet the growing demand for food assistance. More than 1 in 5 Washington residents in 2023 sought help to manage their concerns about food insecurity. 


